

## After a Visit to a Health Professional – Medications

Pre-Reading Discussion: Have you or a family member ever needed prescription medication? Where do you go to get the prescription filled? Prescription medications are also called drugs. What other substances are also called drugs?

This passage is about a woman named Gina who needs to get a prescription filled.

Gina knew something was not right. It felt like every five minutes she had to run to the ladies' room. When she went to the bathroom, it burned like mad. She went to the Urgent Care Clinic in her neighborhood. The doctor told her she had a UTI.

“What is that?” asked Gina.

“It’s an infection of the urinary tract. It should feel quite a bit better after you start taking antibiotics. Do you have any allergies to medications?”

“O.K.,” said the doctor. “We will call in your prescription for Trimox. You need to take one tablet
